


Texas Goat Inventory: The January 1, 2015 all goat inventory in Texas totaled 928 thousand head, 2 percent above last year. Meat and other goats accounted for 88 percent of all goat inventory with 820 thousand head. The Angora goat inventory increased 12 percent to 85 thousand head. The inventory of milk goats on January 1, 2015 totaled 23 thousand head, 15 percent above last year.

Texas Angora Goats and Mohair: The Angora goat inventory as of January 1, 2015 was 9 thousand head higher than the previous year. During 2014, 92 thousand goats and kids were clipped, 12 thousand head higher than the year before. Mohair production increased 90 thousand pounds to 580 thousand pounds. The average clip weight for 2014 was 6.3 pounds. The price per pound of mohair increased \$0.80 in 2014 to \$6.30. This brought the total value of the state's mohair production to 3.65 million dollars for 2014, 959 thousand dollars higher than 2013.



Texas Goat Inventory (January 2015) USDA, National Agricultural Statistics Service, Southern Plains Regional Field Office **U.S. Highlights:** All goat inventory in the United States on January 1, 2015 totaled 2.68 million head. Breeding goat inventory totaled 2.20 million head and market goats totaled 471 thousand head. On January 1, 2015, milk goats totaled 365 thousand head, Angora goats totaled 160 thousand head and meat and other goats totaled 2.15 million head. The 2014 kid crop was 1.71 million head for all goats.

Mohair production during 2014 totaled 880 thousand pounds. Goats and kids clipped, at 159 thousand head, were up 11 percent from 2013. Average weight per clip at 5.5 pounds, was up 2 percent from 2013. Value of mohair production was 4.27 million, 29 percent above 2013.

A random sample of U.S. producers was surveyed to provide data for these estimates. Survey procedures ensured that all sheep and goat producers, regardless of size, had a chance to be included in the survey. Large producers were sampled more heavily than small operations. About 23,000 operators were contacted during the first half of January by mail, telephone and face-to-face personal interview and 71 percent of the reports were usable. Regardless of when operators responded, they were asked to report inventories as of January 1.
