**2019/2020 TEXAS COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT PROGRAM**

The ARK-TEX Regional Review Committee (RRC) Guidebook has been prepared in accordance with the 2018 TxCDBG Action Plan and the 2019-2020 Regional Review Committee Charter and Scoring Guidelines for the Community Development Fund. The Guidebook provides eligible applicants from the ARK-TEX Council of Governments region with the application guidelines necessary to be scored under the ARK-TEX RRC scoring criteria.

## **PART II**

### **ARK-TEX RRC Approved Actions**

1. The ARK-TEX RRC held an RRC Meeting on June 14, 2018, to hear public comments on the proposed objective scoring criteria, and to approve the RRC Guidebook, project priorities and the objective scoring criteria.
2. The RRC selected the Texas Department of Agriculture as support staff to develop and disseminate the RRC Guidebook. The RRC selected the Texas Department Agriculture as support staff to calculate the RRC scores and provide other administrative RRC support.
3. The RRC established the maximum grant amounts for the region:
  - Single jurisdiction: \$ 275,000.00
  - Multi-jurisdictions: \$350,000.00
4. The RRC did not establish set-asides for housing and non-border colonia projects.

2. What is the individual poverty rate (poverty percentage) of the applicant’s jurisdiction?

**(Maximum 14 Points)**

**Methodology:**

Poverty rate may be determined by reviewing the U.S. Census 2016 American Communities Survey (ACS) 5 year estimate data, Table B17021 for the applicant’s jurisdiction. Once this information is obtained for each applicant, the poverty rate for each applicant is calculated by dividing the total number of persons at or below the designated poverty level by the population from which poverty persons was determined. Once this has been determined, the average poverty rate of the applicants is determined by dividing the sum of all poverty rates by the number of applicants.

Next, a base is determined by multiplying the average poverty rate by a constant such as 1.25 to represent 125%. The poverty rate is then divided by the base for each applicant to determine their poverty factor.

Finally, to determine scores the poverty factor for each applicant is multiplied by the total maximum allowable points. **Any applicants exceeding the total allowed points will be capped at the maximum.**

For example, a region has five applicants. The average rate of the five applicants is .2647. A constant of 1.25 is multiplied by the average poverty rate to determine the base. The poverty rate of each applicant is then divided by the base to determine their poverty factor. Finally, scores for each applicant are determined by multiplying the poverty factor by the maximum available points for this scoring criterion.

**EXAMPLE**

Applicant	Poverty Rate	Poverty Factor	Score
A	.1960	0.5924	8.2932
B	.4096	1.2379	14.0000
C	.2276	0.6879	9.6302
D	.3760	1.1364	14.0000
E	.1143	0.3454	4.8363

Average:  $1.3235 / 5 = .2647$

Base =  $1.25 * .2647 = .3309$

3. What is the per capita income of the applicant's jurisdiction?

**(Maximum 8 Points)**

**SCORE** \_\_\_\_\_

**Methodology:** Per capita income may be determined by reviewing the U.S. Census 2016 American Communities Survey (ACS) 5 year estimate data for the applicant's jurisdiction. Once this information is obtained for each applicant, the average annual per capita income is calculated by dividing the sum of all annual per capita incomes by the total number of applicants.

Next, a base is set to provide a constant for the equation. The base is calculated by multiplying the average per capita income by a set number such as .75 to represent 75%. The base is then divided by the annual per capita income for each applicant. This number is referred to as the annual per capita income factor.

Finally to determine the score for each applicant the annual per capita income factor is multiplied by the total maximum allowable points. **Any applicants exceeding the total allowed points will be capped at the maximum.**

For example, a region has five applicants. The average annual per capita income of the five applicants is \$34,200. A constant of .75 is multiplied by the annual average per capita income to determine the base (25,650). The base is then divided by the annual per capita income of each applicant to determine their per capita income factor. Finally, scores for each applicant are determined by multiplying the per capita income factor by the maximum available points for this scoring criterion.

**Projects that include multiple jurisdictions – the applicant with the largest percentage (%) of beneficiaries will be considered the applicant of record.**

**EXAMPLE**

Applicant	Per Capita Income (PCI)	PCI Factor	Score
A	\$36,000	.7125	5.7000
B	\$32,000	.8016	6.4125
C	\$33,500	.7657	6.1254
D	\$34,000	.7544	6.0353
E	\$35,500	.7225	5.7803
	\$171,000		

Average:  $171,000 / 5 = 34,200$

Base=  $.75 * 34,200 = 25,650$

4. What is the unemployment rate for the applicant's jurisdiction based on the appropriate county data?

**(Maximum 14 Points)**

**SCORE** \_\_\_\_\_

**Methodology:** The unemployment rate for the applicant's jurisdiction may be determined by reviewing county data from the Tracer section of the Texas Workforce Commission's website. Next, the average unemployment rate of the applicants is determined by dividing the sum of all unemployment rates by the number of applicants.

Next, a base is determined by multiplying the average unemployment rate by a constant such as 1.25 to represent 125%. The unemployment rate is then divided by the base for each applicant to determine their unemployment factor.

Finally, to determine scores, the unemployment factor for each applicant is multiplied by the total maximum allowable points. **Any applicants exceeding the total allowed points will be capped at the maximum.** For example, a region has five applicants. The average unemployment rate of the five applicants is .2647. A constant of 1.25 is multiplied by the average unemployment rate to determine the base (0.3309). The unemployment rate of each applicant is then divided by the base to determine their unemployment factor. Finally, scores for each applicant are determined by multiplying the unemployment factor by the maximum available points for this scoring criterion.

**EXAMPLE**

Applicant	Unemployment Rate	Unemp Factor	Score
A	.1960	0.5924	8.2932
B	.4096	1.2379	14.0000
C	.2276	0.6879	9.6302
D	.3760	1.1364	14.0000
E	.1143	0.3454	4.8363

Average:  $1.3235 / 5 = .2647$

Base =  $1.25 * .2647 = .3309$

**Methodology:** If the project is for beneficiaries for the entire county, the total population of the county is used. If the project is for activities in the unincorporated area of the county with a target area of beneficiaries, the population category is based on the unincorporated residents for the entire county. For county applications addressing water and sewer improvements in unincorporated areas, the population category is based on the actual number of beneficiaries to be served by the project activities. If the project serves beneficiaries for applications submitted by cities, the total city population is used.

Applicant(s) population equal to or less than 1,500 according to the 2010 Census:

- Match equal to or greater than 5% of grant request **36 points**
- Match at least 4% but less than 5% of grant request **29 points**
- Match at least 3%, but less than 4% of grant request **22 points**
- Match at least 2%, but less than 3% of grant request **14 points**

Applicant(s) population equal to or less than 3,000 but over 1,500 according to the 2010 Census:

- Match equal to or greater than 10% of grant request **36 points**
- Match at least 7.5% but less than 10% of grant request **29 points**

- Match at least 5%, but less than 7.5% of grant request **22 points**
- Match at least 2.5%, but less than 5% of grant request **14 points**
- Match less than 2.5% of grant request **0 points**

Applicant(s) population equal to or less than 5,000 but over 3,000 according to the 2010 Census:

- Match equal to or greater than 15% of grant request **36 points**
- Match at least 11.5% but less than 15% of grant request **29 points**
- Match at least 7.5%, but less than 11.5% of grant request **22 points**
- Match at least 3.5%, but less than 7.5% of grant request **14 points**
- Match less than 3.5% of grant request **0 points**

Applicant(s) population over 5,000 according to the 2010 Census:

- Match equal to or greater than 20% of grant request **36 points**
- Match at least 15% but less than 20% of grant request **29 points**
- Match at least 10%, but less than 15% of grant request **22 points**
- Match at least 5%, but less than 10% of grant request **14 points**
- Match less than 5% of grant request **0 points**

- 7 a. What is applicant's water or sewer rate compared to all applicants as related to the project(s) being submitted for TxCDBG funding?  
**(Maximum 7 Points)**

**Methodology:** Applicant information related to a utility rate will be reviewed and points will be assigned. Applicant must provide the official public record to document the adopted water rate for 5,000 gallons or sewer rate assuming 5,000 gallons of water as of January 1, 2018.

The utility rate of the applicant or the service provider must be associated with the project submitted for TxCDBG funding. Example: If the project is water, then the water rates will be compared to the water rates of all applicants with a water project. However, if the application for TxCDBG funding is for both water and sewer projects, then the score the applicant receives for each rate will be averaged to arrive at a final score.

The applicants' average utility rate will be calculated by dividing the sum of all utility rates by the total number of applicants for the region. Utility rates will be awarded points based upon the following:

Utility rates equal to or above the average rate	7 points
Below average utility rates within a 15% difference of the average rate	6 points
Below average utility rates within a 30% difference of the average rate	4 points
Below average utility rates within a 45% difference of the average rate	2 points
Below average utility rates within a 60% difference of the average rate	1 point
Below average utility rates with a greater than 60% difference of the average rate	0 points

- 7 b. Is the applicant's ad valorem tax rate compared to all applicants as related to the project(s) being submitted for TxCDBG funding?  
**(Maximum 7 Points)**

**Methodology:** Applicant information related to the ad valorem tax rate will be reviewed and points will be assigned. Applicant must provide the official public record to document the adopted tax rate as of January 1, 2018.

The ad valorem tax rate of the applicant must be provided for projects submitted for TxCDBG funding that are not water or sewer. **If the application is for multiple projects (i.e. water or wastewater and another eligible activity), all scores received for each rate will be averaged to arrive at a final score.**

The applicants' average tax rate will be calculated by dividing the sum of all tax rates by the total number of applicants for the region. Ad valorem tax rates will be awarded points based upon the following:

Tax rates equal to or above the average rate	7 points
Below average tax rates within a 15% difference of the average rate	6 points
Below average tax rates within a 30% difference of the average rate	4 points
Below average tax rates within a 45% difference of the average rate	2 points
Below average tax rates within a 60% difference of the average rate	1 point
Below average tax rates with a greater than 60% difference of the average rate	0 points

Cities will be compared to cities and counties will be compared to counties. **If there is only one county applicant, the applicant will be compared to the tax rates of all counties in the region on the specific date given above.**
